<u>Is God Trying to Tell You</u> Something?



Have you ever noticed that sometimes God uses multiple ways to ensure you "get the point?"

Last month was such a time for me. The

various Bible studies I read and participated in, focused my mind on a single idea. It started at an event in March. Donna Snow spoke at St. Paul Lutheran Church in Westlake.

As she pointed out, paying attention during difficult times may teach us a God-lesson in the future. She illustrated this idea with events from the life of the apostle Peter. After His resurrection, Jesus met several disciples by the Sea of Galilee. Jesus helped Peter remember the first great fish catch by providing a second one. Then He helped Peter remember his denials by having breakfast prepared over a charcoal fire.

(Peter had warmed himself on a charcoal fire before his third denial. See John 18:18). So, when Jesus asked, "Peter, do you love me?" Peter was more than



ready to say yes in response to Jesus' love for Him.

Donna also reminded us that when we endure hardships, we can understand and empathize with others experiencing similar things. Who comforts us in all our afflictions, so that we may comfort those who are in any affliction, with the comfort with which we ourselves are comforted by God (2 Corinthians 1:4).

A few days later in a Guidepost devotion, author Ashley Kappel wrote that bruised fruit is sweeter than its unbruised parts. Her point was that God loves us just the way we are. He uses our faults and difficulties to help us become the people he wants us to be.

A reading during our Ladies' Bible

study group from 40 Days with Jesus by Sarah Young, caught my attention.

Be still and know that I am God (Psalm 46:10) reminds us that God is in control, even in difficult times. Colossians 4:2 tells us to continue steadfastly in prayer, watchful with thanksgiving.

Rather than being tense from continually placing our problems before God, we can sincerely pray with a positive mind-set, anticipating the solution God has in mind for us.

These experiences all happened within two weeks. God used three different authors to remind me that even my troubles contribute to me becoming the person I am intended to be. He uses my faults and difficulties to shape me, and I can thank him in advance for his excellent care.

Are you spending time in the Word? Are you open to more than one Bible study process? Is God using those moments with Him to speak to you specifically? Be listening!

Butterflies or Bunnies

There are many symbols around Easter celebration, from Easter eggs

and hot cross buns, Easter lilies, spring flowers, and even the Easter bunny. They are useful in the celebration of new life in our risen Lord Jesus, while others may be a little confusing (like a bunny hiding chicken eggs!).

When I became pastor at Trinity – Cincinnati, I noticed that at Easter they hung figures of butterflies. The butterflies whole life cycle can be used to symbolize the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus. The first stage is that of a caterpillar which might

represent Jesus' earthly life as truly a man. The second phase is the cocoon stage depicting Jesus' death and burial in a tomb. The glorious third stage is that of the beautiful butterfly representing Jesus'



victorious resurrection from the dead. What a meaningful symbol of the life death and resurrection of the God-man, Jesus!

With this in mind, consider the following butterfly parable: As a butterfly soared overhead, one caterpillar said to the other, "You'll never get me up in one of those things." Yet for every caterpillar the time comes when the urge to eat and grow subsides and he instinctively forms a chrysalis around himself. The chrysalis hardens and then one spring morning the life inside the chrysalis writhes, the top cracks open, and a beautifully-formed butterfly emerges. For hours it will stand stretching and drying its wings, moving them slowly up and down. And then, before you know it, the butterfly glides aloft, effortlessly riding the currents of the air, alighting on flower after gorgeous flower, as if to show off its vivid colors to the bright blossoms.

On Easter morning the disciples saw Jesus' grave clothes lying on the cold slab. The corpse was gone, much like an empty chrysalis deserted by a butterfly who had left to soar free. He is not here, for He has risen, as He said (Matthew 28:6) an angel told the women. Later that day He appeared to the disciples, and then, over the course of the next few weeks, to as many as five hundred people at one time. Even "Doubting Thomas" didn't doubt Jesus' resurrection from the dead.

Jesus' resurrection from the grave is God's proof that death is not the end. He conquered death and the devil, and paid the price of sin. The empty tomb and the Holy Spirit within us testify that Easter morning is God's triumph over death. And ultimately, Jesus promised, God will raise from the dead all who believe in His Son.

Why do Christians gather to celebrate Easter morning? To show off their fine clothes or give a ritual tip of the hat to religion? God forbid – but sadly for some this is true! Rather we gather to celebrate Jesus'

victory over death itself. Since He is our Lord and our Savior with whom we are united through Holy Baptism, His victory is our victory! In celebrating His resurrection, we celebrate our own assurance of ultimate triumph over death and the hope of eternal life! Christ is Risen! Alleluia!

Receiving Grant Funds

The LWML Ohio District assists each woman in affirming her mission to the world. Mites are one way the LWML

women minister to the world. Mites are



used to fulfill grant requests submitted to the LWML Ohio District.

The Lutheran Military Veterans & Families Ministries and The Lutheran

Heritage Foundation were chosen for grants in 2022.

The Lutheran Heritage Foundation (LHF), in McComb, Michigan, submitted a request for \$8,500 to fund the printing of 1,700 copies of the book *God's Word for You*, a 300-page Bible book, in a variety of languages here in the U.S. and around the world. LHF received \$3,000 in December 2022, \$3,000 in February 2023, and will receive \$2,500 in May 2023.

Jen Begnall, Director of Public Relations at Lutheran Heritage states that translation work is well underway on *God's Word for You* in the Chichewa language. This language is spoken by millions in Malawi and Zambia, in southeast Africa.

LHF expects that the Chichewa translation of *God's Word for You* will be complete by summer and plans to be ready for the printer in late 2023 with delivery to the Chichewa people in early 2024.

LHF expresses thanks to the LWML Ohio District women for shining the Light of the gospel in a part of the world that daily, must contend with poverty and disease.

Lutheran Military Veterans & Families Ministries (LMVFM) in Fort Wayne, Indiana, submitted a request for \$10,000 to enable and extend outreach, care and counseling for veterans and their and their family members and to expand training programs within the Ohio District. In addition, it requested to expand training programs within the Ohio District. LMVFM received \$5,000 in October 2022, and will receive the remaining \$5,000 in October 2023.

LMVFM added a veteran and his spouse to their counseling team, according to Rob Myers, Director of LMVFM Mission Development. They can also send LMVFM representatives to various places for outreach and training for groups. This will help them recognize symptoms in those seeking LMVFM resources. Rob states that they are grateful for the LWML Ohio District grant money.

It is a joy to discover how mites money from the LWML Ohio District are ministering to the world's people.


