

Our Mites Are Indeed Mighty!

I was sitting here with lots of time on my hands, so I thought about the mites we collect and send to the district. I am always amazed at the things those coins (and dollars) are able to do; at both the district and national level.

The mites collected at this year's national LWML convention during the 4 offering collections totaled \$142,889 (as of September 26, 2019.)

Offering #1: 2019-2021 LWML Mission Goal: \$45,399.42.

Offering #2: Medical Mission Teams/Expanding the Disability Ministry in the Dominican Republic: \$30,950.10

Offering #3: James Storehouse Louisiana/Spiritual Care for Unaccompanied Refugee Children: \$31,120.40

Offering #4: LCMS Disaster Response/Community Relief: \$35,419.08.

The mites collected will definitely be appreciated by all these groups. I just read about the devastation that Tropical Storm Imelda was causing in the areas of Beaumont and Winne, Texas. They received 28 inches of rain and expected 10 more inches in the next 36 hours. The flooding in that area of Texas

is equal to or worse than the flooding after Hurricane Harvey.

There is still an LCMS Disaster Recovery funded/contracted disaster manager in the coastal area of Texas until January 31, 2020. They are overseeing this new flood response work. Rev. Ross Johnson, Director of Disaster Response said "As you can see, the timing of your gift was extraordinary."



God's timing is always perfect. Sometimes I wonder why things happen, but I take comfort in knowing it is all part of God's plan for us. The next time I drop off my Mite Box at church, I will pray that those mites will make a difference in some way. To God be the glory, great things He hath done!



If you have been around LWML for a l..o..n..g time, you might remember Rhea Zarn. She was LWML Ohio District President in the late eighties and she was the chairman of the Host



Committee for the 50th Anniversary convention held in Cleveland in 1991. She was a wonderful example to the women who knew her and an unofficial mentor for dozens of LWML members in Ohio.

Rhea and her husband Ed donated their bodies to the Medical College of Ohio so that future doctors could study them. Recently her family held a short memorial service in which their cremains were finally put to rest. They invited church members to attend with the family. Rhea's niece had designed special urns for them. Mary Fowler, her daughter, told us a little about

the urns. She said that the theme for Rhea's urn would either be her favorite song "Sheep May Safely Graze," or the other choice would have to be LWML. (The sheep won.) For Ed's urn, there were Christmas trees (he grew them) and his bi-plane signature (he was a Navy veteran from WWII).

After the service, Kathy Ewald, a church member, presented the family with three small items. For Ed,

she contributed a small American flag and one of the crepe paper poppies that we see on Memorial Day to say we will not forget. For Rhea, she brought a Mite Box. The box immediately received some coins from her son, Paul. The items were placed in the containers that went into the

ground. So, when Jesus returns, our Rhea will be ready with her Mite Box!
