A favorite song from the movie *The Lion King* is "Hakuna Matata." That motto means no worries for the rest of your days. It offers a problem–free philosophy. Wouldn't that be a wonderful promise for life – no worries, no problems.

God does tell us not to worry or be anxious about anything in our lives. In fact, the Bible has several specific verses dedicated to the command of not to worry as well as other verses directing us not to be anxious. God certainly wants us to turn our burdens, stresses, and concerns over to Him.

I had quickly forgotten that God has told me that HE would provide for all my needs, not the lottery!

As I finished my walk and drove home, I remembered a favorite Bible verse: *Do not be anxious about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving, let your requests be made known to God* (Philippians 4:6).

While we are never promised a problem-free life, we are promised a life guided and directed by our living, loving Lord. God knows exactly what we need, when we need it. He will provide for us, one day at a time. As we rely more on God and less on ourselves, we become convinced that we do not have to worry. My favorite quote from Martin Luther is; "Pray and let God worry." God is the only solution to a worry-free life!

As we begin the holiday season, I count each and every one of you a blessing from God as together we serve the Lord with gladness.

The LWML National Primary Focus for the 2017-2019 biennium i s a n three interconnected part emphasis: Nurturing Faith in Christ, Making Our Faith Meaningful, and Sharing Encouragement. Paul's Letter to the Philippians, in

chapter 2:1-18, takes up a similar three fold focus borne out from Jesus' example of humility.

Nurturing Faith in Christ occurs by being in the Word; meaning that you are to hold fast to the word of life (Phil. 2:16, ESV) found in Holy Scripture. In so doing, you will better understand and appreciate God in Christ "taking the form of a servant" and being born in the likeness of men... [humbling] himself by becoming obedient to the point of death, even death on a cross" (Phil. 2:7-8, ESV). It is only through this sacrificial death in your place that brings you, by faith, forgiveness, life and salvation.

This Good News and servant character of Jesus then, through baptism, enables you to have this mind [of Christ] among yourselves (Phil 2:5, ESV). You therefore, by the power of the Holy Spirit, are guided and enabled to do nothing from selfish ambition or conceit, but in humility count others as more significant than yourselves (Phil. 2:3, ESV). As a result you look not only to [your] own interests, but also to the interests of others (Phil. 2:3-4, ESV), Making Your Faith Meaningful.

Not only does faith reveal itself through actions because of the power and work of the Word, but also manifests itself by **Sharing Encouragement**. Being of the same mind as Christ brings forth words of comfort and love, affection and sympathy. This is the "encouragement in Christ" (Phil. 2:1, ESV) and a witness to others of the hope that is in you.

If you are considering updating your zone bylaws you probably want to take the time to make them look good. The LWML has resources on their web page that will help. One interesting resource is the LWML Style Guide. Sometimes it is hard to remember when or what to capitalize.

Capitalize district, zone, society, committee, etc. only when part of a proper name; always capitalize LWML, committee and department names. An example: The LWML Ohio District hosted the event. Sally attended the district convention.

Capitalize bylaws when referring to official name: the Bylaws of the Lutheran Women's Missionary League.

Use lowercase when using general terms: Our bylaws need to be revised. Some technical terms to know: cellphone, Smartphone, online, username, all written as one word. So are website, and webmaster, although World Wide Web is capitalized and written as individual words.



Forty-five women and five youth enjoyed the program that included a magician, singing and delicious food. Most wore purple and bling, a few wore hats.

A PowerPoint presentation took our ladies to the beginning of church women's groups doing service for seminarians and in their communities and how the LWML



became an organization. Two of Trinity's women attended the 1953 International LWML (ILWML) Convention in Portland, Oregon.

An emphasis was made on the 1991 ILWML Convention held in Cleveland, Ohio, when the Ohio District was host. One of Trinity's members even wore the purple dress she made to wear while she served as an usher at the convention. The 2010 LWML Ohio District Convention, which the Toledo Zone hosted, and the 2011, 2013, 2015 and 2017 national conventions were also highlighted in the presentation. An explanation of the new LWML logo was given.

Each lady received a new Mite Box, LWML Mission Grant Prayer Card and Mustard Seed. The youth received a children's Mite Box. The purpose of the Mite Box was explained and the women new to LWML commented that they learned a lot. A generous mites collection was received.


