 Blessed is the man who walks not in the counsel of the wicked, nor stands in the way of sinners, nor sits in the seat of scoffers;

When my delight is in others' approval or praise, I wither when I don't get that approval or praise. When my delight is in my success, I wither when I am not successful - either in my own eyes, or by what the world tells me is success.

When my delight is in anything but the law of the Lord, I am bound - sooner or later - to be disappointed and my leaves wither. And a tree with withered leaves produces no fruit. No good fruit, anyway.

So how can I be renewed? How can I get my strength and energy back? I can delight in the Lord's law. "Law" there doesn't refer to the Ten Commandments, it means the Hebrew word Torah, which means word or instruction; it is what the first five books of the Bible are called - the Torah.

We could say it is a shorthanded way of saying God's Word, or the whole Bible. That is where I learn about all God has done for me in His Son Jesus Christ. That is where I discover how valuable I am to God - that He would trade His own Son for me, a sinner, so that I could be saved. That is where I hear of His forgiveness for my failures. That is where I hear that God is working all things for my benefit - even things I think are wrong, or struggles that are tough.

That is where I hear all of God's promises to me; all that He has for me; more than I could ever imagine. When my delight is in Him and His Word, I have what I need. This will get me through the trials, struggles, and disappointments of this world and life. For through His Word comes the living water of the Holy Spirit, the Lord and giver of life, to give me life and hope again. Yes, life and strength for a withering man and his withering leaves.

Lord, help me delight in Your Word, and give me the strength, energy, and confidence I need for this day. I need Your Spirit's living water that gives me life now and forever. Amen.

At the 2024 LWML Ohio District Convention in North Canton, Ohio, the Lutheran Women in Mission voted to grant Lutheran Military Veterans & Family Ministries \$10,000, a gesture that expands counseling and care programs for veterans and their families. This act of generosity provides support, particularly through initiatives like the Paws and Effect program, which pairs therapy dogs with veterans to help them cope with emotional and physical challenges. LMVFM is dedicated to offering a welcoming, non-judgmental environment for veterans, regardless of their faith, and provides training and resources to congregations, ensuring that their support extends far beyond their walls.

In addition, the Ohio District granted \$12,000 to LCMS Church Worker Students, helping ease the financial burdens of around 35 students at LCMS Concordia University Systems. This grant not only supports tuition but also serves as a powerful message of encouragement, reminding students that their community believes in them. The support is deeply appreciated, as seen in the grateful responses from students like Miss Hannah Ryan, who has gone on to serve as the Director of Christian Ministries at Bethlehem Lutheran Church. These acts of kindness help foster connections and growth, shaping the next generation of compassionate leaders.

Furthering God's Kingdom

How are our Mite donations used to further God's Kingdom?

Our Mite offerings not only fund our Mission Grant goal, they also fund our district publications, events, and meetings. Twenty-Five percent of our mite offerings are sent to national LWML. Our budget, which was voted on in June 2024 is \$171,400. The Mission Grant Goal is \$95,000 of this budget. LWML Ohio District is a Christ focused, mission minded organization. This means we fund our mission grants first. However, when an update on mite money is needed to make our goal for the biennium and is sent out, it is for the entire budget amount. For example, in December our mites collected since April 1 was \$63,995.38. This means that in order to meet our budget of \$171,400.00, we need to collect \$7,846.05 each month. If we would only use the Mission Grant goal amount, the money needed to collect would be much lower, but then no internal operations would be able to happen, like training, publications, etc.
